## Once bitten twice shy – Experience gained from Work in an experimental Basin in the Alps

When the authors of this poster began their work in the experimental catchment Löhnersbach (province of Salzburg, Austria; gauge at 12° 40.02' E, 47° 21.50' N; WGS84) in the northern Greywack zone of the Alps nearly fifteen years ago they certainly had formed a clear picture of the investigations to be performed but they were not too well versed in handling measuring instruments and installing them in a rather harsh Alpine environment. Since then, many lessons had to be learned.
